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## Introduction

The many organizations that provide cultural and historical facilities and services in our communities are often taken for granted, but they provide rich educational opportunities for young children, new citizens, and students. They also enhance the quality of life for all Californians. Such organizations are often, however, seriously underfunded, and struggle to meet operating expenses. Their ability to undertake larger capital improvement projects that address important issues such as bringing a building into compliance for seismic safety, providing better access for the disabled according to the Americans with Disabilities Act, or correcting outdated and unsafe building code violations is significantly hampered by their limited resources.

California has over one thousand museums and hundreds of additional organizations which make cultural and historical facilities and services available to the general public. The vast majority of these organizations are nonprofit organizations, though many are publicly supported or privately-run entities.

The enabling legislation of the California Cultural and Historical Endowment (CCHE), Assembly Bill 716, included as part of the bill's comprehensive cultural survey component the requirement that the CCHE survey the capacities and fiscal conditions of public, nonprofit, and other private entities in California that provide historical facilities and services, including museums. The legislation also included the requirement that the CCHE develop recommendations for the future financing of cultural and historical programs provided by public agencies and nonprofit agencies in California, including museums. This report summarizes our efforts to address those requirements.

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## Executive Summary

The California Cultural and Historical Endowment (CCHE) awarded over \$122.5 million to 150 organizations for 180 projects in California between 2005 and 2010. The total value of all applications from CCHE's four rounds of competitive grant submissions from 2005-2010 comes very close to \$921 million. A complete listing of all of CCHE's applicants from all four rounds is attached as Appendix 1. That figure includes the \$122.5 million in CCHE grants that were funded and includes some duplication from applicants who did not get funded in one round and submitted an application again in another round. We've attempted to calculate the amount of those duplicate submissions and have come up with the figure of \$150 million (See Appendix 2).

After subtracting the estimated duplicate submission figure of \$150 million and removing the funded grants of \$122.5 million, we estimate that there would still be a need of close to \$650 million for historic and cultural preservation capital improvements in California. (\$921 million minus \$150 million equals \$771 million. \$771 million minus \$122.5 million equals \$648.5 million).

The unfunded need of \$650 million roughly estimated from CCHE funding round applications through 2010 is substantiated by this 2012 survey which demonstrates aggregate needs that range from \$585 million on the low end to \$1.1 billion on the high end. These costs include three categories of capital improvements which were considered in the survey: structural integrity improvements, interior or operational enhancements, and expansions.

This report also responds to the element of the survey that required that we address the issue of future financing of cultural heritage institutions. The CCHE recommends two financing mechanisms to provide new financial resources to help preserve state historic and cultural resources.

Since the 1980s, existing state law has allowed state taxpayers to contribute money to Voluntary Contribution Funds (VCFs) to fund a variety of charitable causes. VCFs are placed on the state income tax form through legislative action. CCHE recommends that a VCF for cultural heritage preservation be established. This would allow Californians to contribute \$1 or more to support museums, cultural centers, and historical sites, with administration of the resources to be handled by the CCHE.

The only other method that has been used effectively by the state to finance capital improvement projects for cultural heritage resources is statewide general obligation bonds. The CCHE continues to believe that statewide general obligation bonds are the most viable method for financing statewide cultural and historical resource preservation.

CCHE commissioned a polling firm to assess public support for cultural heritage organizations in general and the public's support for state funding of cultural heritage organizations. The results demonstrate a constituency that seems to recognize the value of cultural heritage organizations as educational institutions that benefit society by providing a deeper understanding of the world around us. The results demonstrated a strong majority of respondents who were supportive of public funding for major building repairs and improvements for museums, cultural centers, and historical sites and a modest majority that even supported the idea of some public funding for operating expenses of those kinds of organizations.

The poll found almost 80% of respondents would support the VCF concept (\$1 checkbox) and 67% of the respondents would support another bond measure for cultural and historical resource preservation.

### **Institutional Capacity of Cultural Heritage Organizations in California**

Assembly Bill 716, the enabling legislation of the California Cultural and Historical Endowment (CCHE), included as part of the bill's comprehensive cultural survey component the requirement that the CCHE survey the capacities and fiscal conditions of public, nonprofit, and other private entities in California that provide historical facilities and services, including museums.

The CCHE chose to interpret the capacity question from a capital improvements framework since the state has not historically provided funding for operating expenses of nonprofit or private organizations that provide historical and cultural facilities and services. The state does fund the operating budgets of some public entities that provide historical and cultural facilities and services – California State Parks, for example – but state resources in the last decade have been shrinking so significantly that even that funding falls far short of meeting the true operating budget needs of those organizations.

Accordingly, we felt that approaching the question from a capital improvements perspective was most appropriate and reasonable in light of past funding history and likely future funding and support for these kinds of organizations.



### **CCHE's Methodology for the Cultural Organizations Survey**

CCHE assembled a listing of California cultural heritage preservation organizations, building on the lists of multiple statewide and regional associations. We invited the resulting group to participate in our electronic survey. We advised them in our communications that our goal was to gather information in order to gain an understanding of their capital improvement needs so as to establish a body of evidence regarding the level of funding needed for historic and cultural preservation projects in California.

CCHE also advised the survey takers that, pursuant to our enabling legislation, CCHE would be developing recommendations for future financing options for historic and cultural preservation projects in the state.

To implement the survey, we utilized the online survey tool, Survey Monkey. We developed a survey instrument with only ten streamlined questions in order to improve our chances of getting both more responses and more complete survey responses. We consulted with another survey veteran in the state and further refined our questions to diminish the chances for confusing or misleading questions.

CCHE culled the list of emails, eliminating emails that bounced back when a preliminary notification email was initially sent out. Ultimately, we sent emails out to approximately 1,400 organizations, soliciting their participation in the survey. At least three follow-up emails were sent to encourage responses. The survey was kept open between June 15, 2012 and July 30, 2012. A total of 270 organizations, or 19%, responded to the survey, a response rate that was almost twice our target response rate of 10%. A listing of the organizations which responded to the survey is attached as Appendix 3.

This funding has helped to develop a systematic and coordinated assemblage of buildings, sites, museums, and interpretive centers that preserve and tell the stories of California and the many groups of people that together comprise historic and modern California.

Please assist us in collecting information regarding your organization's capital improvement needs by completing our survey. Your information will be one component of our comprehensive cultural survey to determine the capacities of public, non-profit, and other private entities in California that provide cultural and historical facilities and services to the people of our state.

## ***Survey Questions***

**Q1 What** kind of institution are you?:

- c) history museum
- d) house museum
- e) cultural center

Next, we want to ask you about your future Capital Improvement Projects and the related costs or financial needs to cover these projects. These would include tangible physical property improvements with an expected useful life of 15 years or more.

The three Capital Improvements we will ask you about are:

- (1) **Structural Integrity Improvements** to your existing facilities. Examples would include a new roof, repair of water or termite damage, foundation work to repair damage or wear, faulty or dangerous wiring, replacing windows, etc.
- (2) **Interior or Operational Enhancements** needed at your existing facilities. Examples of this would be new walls/physical dividers in an existing building; wiring, lighting, HVAC, or similar changes made to support changed layout of existing structures; the addition of photovoltaic power; and changes to enhance safety or improve access.
- (3) **Expansions.** This includes construction of completely new buildings; the expansion of existing buildings; and/or the acquisition of new properties.

**Costs** may include all costs incidentally but directly related to construction or acquisition, including planning, engineering, construction management, architectural and other design work, environmental impact reports and assessments, required mitigation expenses, appraisals, legal expenses, site acquisitions, and necessary easements.

## Survey Results

We asked respondents to self-identify regarding organization type and received the following information from 259 of the 270 respondents (11 skipped this question):

**30 (11.6%) - Art Museum:** An organization that exhibits art, usually visual art

**27 (10.4%) – Science Museum:** An organization that is devoted primarily to science

**112 (43.2%) – History Museum:** An organization that cares for and exhibits a collection of objects of historical importance

**34 (13.1%) – House Museum:** An organization devoted to transforming a historical house into a museum

**56 (21.6%) – Cultural Center:** An organization that promotes culture and hands-on interaction with the arts.

The second question introduced the substance of the survey.

Next, we want to ask you about your *future Capital Improvement Projects* and the related costs or financial needs to cover these projects. These would include tangible physical property improvements with an expected useful life of 15 years or more.

For the following questions, the three Capital Improvements we will ask you about are:

- . **STRUCTURAL INTEGRITY IMPROVEMENTS TO YOUR EXISTING FACILITIES.** *Examples would include a new roof, repair of water or termite damage, foundation work to repair damage or wear, faulty or dangerous wiring, replacing windows, etc.*
- . **EXPANSIONS.** *This includes construction of completely new buildings; the expansion of existing buildings; and/or the acquisition of new properties.*
- . **INTERIOR OR OPERATIONAL ENHANCEMENTS NEEDED AT YOUR EXISTING FACILITIES.** *Examples of this would be new walls/physical dividers in an existing building; wiring, lighting, HVAC, or similar changes made to support changed layout of existing structures; the addition of photovoltaic power; and changes to enhance safety or improve access.*

Note: Costs may include all costs incidentally but directly related to construction or acquisition, including planning, engineering, construction management, architectural and other design work, environmental impact reports and assessments, required mitigation expenses, appraisals, legal expenses, site acquisitions, and necessary easements.

Question 2: Considering only *Structural Integrity Improvements*, how much money has your organization identified as being needed over the next five years (July 2012 to June 2017)?

Of the 270 respondents who responded to the survey, 242 answered this question and 28 skipped the question. Based on the response count for each of the categories we are able to make an estimate of the aggregate need on both the low and high end of the survey answer ranges. Full calculations supporting the aggregated estimated needs may be found in Appendix 1.

The estimated funding needed in the aggregate for **Structural Integrity Improvements** in the next five years is **\$172 million** on the low end of the survey answer ranges and **\$331 million** on the high end. These figures represent a response rate of roughly 19% of the overall population of cultural heritage organization organizations in the state so one could project that the overall state need for **Structural Integrity Improvements** is closer to \$860 million on the low end and \$1.655 billion on the high end. Structural Integrity Improvements include a new roof, repair of water or termite damage, foundation work to repair damage or wear, faulty or dangerous wiring, replacing windows, etc.

Also interesting to note is that the majority of respondents, almost 40%, have a need for a fairly small amount of funding, between \$10,000 to \$100,000 to help with structural integrity improvements, followed closely by almost 30% of respondents needing almost \$500,000. Only 10% of the respondents reported structural improvement needs in excess of \$5 million. The chart below shows the breakdown of these needs.



**Question 3: Considering only *Expansions*, how much money has your organization identified as being needed over the next five years (July 2012 to June 2017)?**


Of the 270 respondents who responded to the survey, 207 answered this question and 63 skipped the question. Based on the response count for each of the categories we are able to make an estimate of the aggregate need on both the low and high end of the survey answer ranges. Full calculations supporting the aggregated estimated needs may be found in Appendix 1.

The estimated funding needed in the aggregate for **Expansions** in the next five years is **\$270 million** on the low end of the survey answer ranges and **\$438 million** on the high end. These figures represent a response rate of roughly 19% of the overall population of cultural heritage organization organizations in the state so one could project that the overall state need for **Expansions** is closer to \$1.355 billion on the low end and \$2.19 billion on the high end. Expansions include construction of completely new buildings; the expansion of existing buildings; and/or the acquisition of new properties.

With expansions there is still a majority of respondents, albeit a smaller majority of only 30%, with a need for a fairly small amount of funding, between \$10,000 to \$100,000 for expansions, with the remaining respondents quite evenly distributed across the answer options. The chart below shows the breakdown of these needs.

Chart 2: Expansions

Also of interest regarding structural integrity improvements, expansions, and interior or operational enhancements is the need response by organization type, as noted in the next chart. Art museums show the most moderate needs in terms of structural integrity improvements and science museums have the biggest needs in both structural integrity improvements and expansion plans. This might reflect the need for art museums to ensure that their collections are kept safe by ensuring the structural integrity of their building at all times and it might reflect the need of science museums to stay current with technology in order to maintain their relevance in a rapidly changing world.

**Question 4:** Considering only *Interior or Operational Enhancements*, how much money has your organization identified as being needed over the next five years (July 2012 to June 2017)?

Of the 270 respondents who responded to the survey, 246 answered this question and 24 skipped the question. Based on the response count for each of the categories we are able to make an estimate of the aggregate need on both the low and high end of the survey answer ranges. Full calculations supporting the aggregated estimated needs may be found in Appendix 1.

The estimated funding needed in the aggregate for **Interior or Operational Enhancements** in the next five years is **\$143 million** on the low end of the survey answer ranges and **\$314 million** on the high end. The average enhancement figure is \$224 million.

These figures represent a response rate of roughly 19% of the overall population of cultural heritage organization organizations in the state so one could project that the overall state need for **Interior or Operational Enhancements** is closer to \$715 million on the low end and \$1.57 billion on the high end. Interior or Operational Enhancements includes construction of completely new buildings; the expansion of existing buildings; and/or the acquisition of new properties.

As the table below indicates, a majority of the respondents (55%) indicated that as much as 20% of their budgets for interior or operational enhancements would go to disability access and safety upgrades, 38% indicated that 20% of their budget would be applied for seismic upgrades, 25% indicate that 20% of their budgets would be for

improvements related to their organizations' core missions, and smaller percentages of respondents indicated that larger percentages of their budgets would be devoted to these purposes.

## **Question 9: Do you have any general comments about your capital needs overall in the next 5 years?**

Of the 268 respondents to the survey, 157 provided an answer to the open-ended question. A summary narrative of topics from those responses follows below.

### **Energy Efficiency Improvements**

Several sites spoke of planned or needed improvements related to energy efficiency. Like many buildings with long-term goals of serving the public, these sites have an eye toward reducing their carbon footprint. With limited resources these goals may manifest as new lighting and plumbing fixtures, repairs to HVAC systems and replacing older equipment with new, more efficient models. Other sites have more ambitious plans (sometimes attached to the construction of new facilities or large-scale renovations) that include switching to solar power for lighting and heating.

### **Restoration of Aging Facilities**

A large number of comments received from the survey regarding Capital Needs for the present and near future revolved around restorative projects for the respondents' facilities. In many cases, sites referred to "critical improvements" necessary to ensure the safety and integrity of their museums. These considerations most often revolved around: Large-scale renovations (roofing and plumbing) due to extended weather damage, seismic retrofits of foundations and structural supports, handicap accessibility, and the historic preservation of certain sites (e.g. Historical Residences/Museums) involving wall and floor replacements.

### **Space Needs**

Sixteen respondents indicated their facilities had reached the point in the recent past where renovations or improvements were no longer feasible. For these sites, half were already in new buildings and the others were close to a solution. It did not appear that their survey responses included requests for funds for these moves.

Several other sites noted the need to expand existing structures to better serve the needs of the museums and the public. For some, though there is an identified and pressing need, expansion will wait until future economics provide stable support for such projects, while others find themselves in a position to move forward.

Needs for expansion, in some circumstances, were directly due to a lack of exhibit space. In these situations, respondents spoke of using capital in order to secure appropriate storage space for museum pieces and exhibits until the time at which they may be properly displayed for public audiences.

### **Renovation of Exterior Grounds**

A number of survey respondents operate museums or historical sites that include large exterior grounds containing gardens, stables and other open-outdoor structures. These items represent significant maintenance costs in and of themselves. Basic infrastructure related to these areas such as irrigation, road and walkways and, in some cases, electrical systems were items commented on by survey respondents as areas of consideration related to their on-going Capital Needs.

### **General Maintenance**

Given the general financial strain of recent years, deferred maintenance has become a significant issue for many museums throughout the State. All told, 22 (14%) of those who responded noted costs related to general maintenance as a significant concern. Twelve respondents (8%) expressly cited general maintenance that had been deferred due to budgetary limitations and stated that these deferments had led to more significant needs in maintenance and repair over time (roofs, flooring due to water damage, etc.).

Examples given of general maintenance needs included: painting, lighting, carpeting, and weather repairs (roof and windows). Other, less reported items related to equipment maintenance and upgrades. An example of this is an

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Arts Museum that offers workshops to the public. Those facilities occasionally require care and improvement of printmaking, photography and digital media equipment.

### **Exhibit Maintenance/Upgrades**

In many cases respondents indicated a need for their facilities to retrofit or otherwise maintain their existing displays to prevent them from falling into disarray. For some, keeping the integrity of their public service means procuring new exhibits altogether. Certain exhibits referenced were relatively modest in implementation requirements (displays) while others require significantly increased planning and resources, such as educational exhibits.

### **Studies and Consultants**

Several survey respondents noted costs associated with hiring consultants and commissioning studies appropriate to various site improvement/development projects. Examples of these considerations included planning and environmental review for new buildings, consultations related to proper restoration of historic structures, and expert analysis and planning related to structural integrity (seismic reporting, etc.).

### **Other Comments Not Directly Related to Capital Needs**

As a footnote, some respondents spoke of peripheral costs necessary for the successful operation of their facilities. These involved expenditures toward sending staff to conferences to maintain high-levels of knowledge in service to their public audiences and hiring revenue maximization consultants to aide efforts toward long-term sustainability.



### **Conclusions regarding Capacity of California's Cultural Heritage Organizations**

The CCHE awarded over \$122.5 million to 150 organizations for 180 projects in California between 2005 and 2010. The total value of all applications from CCHE's four rounds of competitive grant submissions from 2005-2010 comes very close to \$921 million. A complete listing of all of CCHE's applicants from all four rounds is attached as Appendix 1. That figure includes the \$122.5 million in CCHE grants that were funded and also likely includes some duplication from applicants who did not get funded in one round and submitted an application again in the next round. Estimating that at \$150 million (See Appendix 2) and removing the funded grants of \$122.5 million still results in a need of close to \$650 million for historic and cultural preservation capital improvements in California.

This survey substantiates those calculations with figures that range from \$585 million on the low end to \$1.1 billion on the high end. These costs include all three categories of capital improvements which were considered in the survey: structural integrity improvements, interior or operational enhancements, and expansions.



## **Recommendations for the Future Financing of Cultural Heritage Organizations**

CCHE's enabling legislation requires CCHE to recommend suggestions for the future financing of cultural heritage organizations.

The CCHE recommends two financing mechanisms to preserve state historic and cultural resources.

Since the 1980s, existing state law has allowed state taxpayers to contribute money to Voluntary Contribution Funds (VCFs) to fund a variety of charitable causes. VCFs are included on the state income tax form through legislative action and are allowed to remain on the state tax return until they are either repealed or fail to meet the minimum contribution amount, which is adjusted annually for inflation. For most VCFs, the minimum contribution amount is \$250,000 in the fund's second year. The California Arts Council was successful in getting on the tax return as a VCF in 2010 and eight bills for new causes were proposed in 2011. Despite the explosion of charitable causes appearing on the tax form, the CCHE recommends that a VCF for cultural heritage be established. This would allow Californians to contribute \$1 or more to support museums, cultural centers, and historical sites, with administration of the resources to be handled by the CCHE.

The only other method that has been used by the state to finance capital improvement projects for cultural heritage resources is general obligation bonds. The CCHE received a share of the 2002 bond initiative known as Proposition 40, the California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks and Coastal Protection Act of 2002. The entire bond authorization was \$2.6 billion and, of that amount, \$267.5 million was made available for historic and cultural resource preservation. CCHE received \$128.4 million from that bond initially and was able to establish funding priorities and make grants of \$122.5 million with that funding.

The CCHE continues to believe that statewide general obligation bonds are the most viable method for financing statewide cultural and historical resource preservation.



## **Telephone Poll to Assess Public Support of State Funding of Cultural Heritage Organizations**

CCHE commissioned a polling firm to assess public support cultural heritage organizations in general and the public's support for state funding of cultural heritage organizations. CCHE hired Competitive Edge Research and Communications (CERC), a polling firm, to conduct a telephone poll to assess the public's support for cultural heritage organizations in general and the public's support for state funding of cultural heritage organizations. The results demonstrate a constituency that seems to recognize the value of cultural heritage organizations and support the idea of providing public funding for cultural heritage organizations.

### **Methodology and Polling Instrument**

CCHE provided CERC with a survey draft. Based on the survey objectives, and conversations with the CCHE staff, President John Nienstedt recommended edits to the draft survey. CERC worked closely with the CCHE to ensure that the survey addressed all of the CCHE's objectives and the questions were clear, concise and instructive. The questionnaire design and editing process was collaborative, ensuring both parties were engaged in the survey design process and satisfied with the survey content. Before fielding the survey, CERC submitted a final draft to the CCHE for final approval.

CERC procured a random listed landline sample of active California voters from Political Data Inc. of Norwalk, CA. A sample of 1000 voters provided a margin of sampling error of 3.1% (at the 95% confidence level). The polling firm utilized the attached assessment instrument in its survey of 1,000 California voters.

### **Programming**

Surveys were programmed using the Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. CATI programming allows CERC to automatically route the interviewer through the interview to ensure that skip-patterns are used properly, that only the correct codes are entered, that data entry errors are prevented and that quality control is maintained.

### **Fielding**

Fielding time is a function of questionnaire length and the size of the sample. With a sample of 1000, data collection took place over four to five days. To ensure top quality data collection, all interviewers were specifically trained on the project and its intricacies.

All of the interviews were conducted on-site in the San Diego offices with no element of the interviewing sub-contracted to an outside vendor. CERC used only experienced, professional interviewers who are supervised by employees with an average of 13 years experience in call center management and/or quality control, and who were trained in research methods. The quality control methodology was multi-pronged, including a 10:1 ratio of interviews to quality control staff; real-time visual and audio monitoring, as well as remote monitoring capability, using state-of-the-art CATI and telecommunications systems; and systematic analysis of interviews using a proprietary formula encompassing such variables as cooperation rate, refusal rate, monitoring evaluations and interviewer performance scores to ensure the highest quality interviewing was conducted.




This analysis is based on the results from the poll of 1,002 California voters which we fielded June 22 through June 24, 2012. The margin of sampling error is +/- 3.1% at the 95% confidence level.

The average California voter visited museums, cultural centers or heritage sites 6.6 times during the past three years or a little more than twice a year. That equates to 37,700,000 visits just by California voters. Considering that many children, non-voters and people from outside the state visit these sites in California, the number of people accommodated is staggering. However, half of the electorate has visited less than once a year, with 30% not setting foot in a museum, cultural center or historical site since 2009. In fact, as the chart below shows, the average number of visits skews higher due to a few people who visited 100 or more times in the past three years.




The most salient variable for predicting how often a voter will visit a museum, cultural center or historical site is their ideology. Because slightly more California voters rate themselves as liberal than conservative, this bodes well for attendance. Those on the liberal side of the ideological spectrum visit far more often than those on the conservative side. Over the past three years, as the chart shows, very liberal voters visited, on average, more than four times as often as very conservative voters did.


Those with more education and those who are more likely to vote also visit museums, cultural centers or historical sites more frequently than their less educated or less participatory counterparts. Education levels for voters tend to be high -- only 13% have not attended college and 23% have earned an advanced degree -- so the state's museums have a robust supply of visitors.




There is a tremendous amount of agreement with the rationales we tested for museums, cultural centers or historical sites. Californians generally accept the idea that museums, cultural centers and historical sites benefit society and that they are educational. Looking at the results for the two questions together, three-quarters of the state's voters strongly agree with both supportive statements and only 3% express consistent disagreement.




Voters also express a great deal of agreement with the notion that the state should spend some money for capital improvements to museums, cultural centers and historical sites. There is a bit more resistance to spending state funds for operating expenses. Agreement here is notably less intense, but two-thirds do agree that the state should provide more funding to cover the operating expenses for museums, cultural centers and historical sites.



Voters are wildly supportive of a check box on their California state income tax forms that would send one dollar to support museums, cultural centers and historical sites. Half say they would *definitely* donate a dollar in this way.




The generally strong agreement with the rationales for museums explains a lot of why voters enthusiastically support the check box approach to funding them. The huge number of voters who strongly agree that museums are educational and benefit society would overwhelmingly donate the dollar. Making the donation via the income tax check box decreases among those who agree less wholeheartedly. However, even the small number who disagree with the rationales for museums, cultural centers and historical sites, mostly say they would donate, though support among them is much less intense.




Looking at the question from other angles, conservative Republicans are not as likely to donate as others, women are more likely to donate than men, and San Francisco Bay area residents are less enthusiastic about the \$1 donation than voters in other parts of California. Los Angeles County is the state’s largest single population center and we find no dip in support for the check box in that region. Voters who visit the museums, cultural centers and historical sites more often are far more likely to contribute, but even those who have not visited or who visited only once in the past three years would usually donate the dollar. Unreliable voters are more inclined to donate than those who vote every chance they get.


A bond measure is also supported by a large majority, though not as much as the one-dollar donation.



The main thing a bond measure to fund museums, cultural centers and historical sites has going for it is that an overwhelming number of voters heartily accept the rationales for them. Nearly three-quarters of those who strongly agree that museums are both educational and beneficial to society would vote for the bond measure. The results are positive for voters who are a bit less strongly committed to museums, but the bond measure still receives support from more than half of them. It gets into trouble among those who seriously qualify their feelings about museums and if an election were held only among them and the voters who do not see these resources as educational or beneficial, the bond measure would lose. Happily, for the measure's proponents, those voters are far out-numbered by the fans of museums, cultural centers and historical sites.




Another determinant of support and opposition is a voter's ideology. Very liberal voters are wildly enthusiastic about the measure and moderate liberals are also supportive. Even most moderates in the middle of the ideological spectrum and voters who label themselves as somewhat conservative are voting "yes." The problem for proponents comes among those on the far right where support does not break 50%.



Democrats are highly supportive, but Republicans are far less enthusiastic, with their support reaching only 49%. Those outside of the major parties tend to be voting "yes," though support among them is less intense than it is among Democrats.

Education levels exert a modest and inverse effect on opinions related to the bond measure.



education are highly supportive and those who have earned college degrees exhibit some degree of opposition. This is not to say that most of the college educated voters actually oppose the measure -- only 24% with a degree are voting "no," but what opposition there is becomes more intense within those segments.

We also find that bond proponents will want to avoid a low turnout election. Very reliable voters -- those who vote in primaries -- are less enthusiastic about the bond measure than less reliable voters.

Geographically, the Bay area is the one region where support is significantly less strong. Even there, about 60% of the voters say they will support the bond measure.

Finally, support among naturalized citizens is more substantial than it is among US-born voters. Half the state's voters were born in California, but 36% immigrated from elsewhere in the United States and 14% are foreign-born.
