Subject: Los Vaqueros Reservoir - Leadership failure and accountability

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Dear CWC Commissioners, Los Vaqueros Reservoir JPA Directors, CCWD Directors, Staff and the Public,

This is my 48th letter to the California Water Commission (CWC). Please embed this public comment into the 6 July 2022 CCWD Board, 13 July 2022 Los Vaqueros Reservoir Joint Powers Authority (JPA) Board and 20 July 2022 CWC meeting agendas under public comment.

I am a 38 year customer of CCWD. I enjoy rowing, swimming and fishing in the Sacramento San Joaquin river Delta. Los Vaqueros Reservoir has failed me due to leadership failure and it is time to hold the leaders responsible accountable by asking for their resignations so please consider this my request for CCWD Board and Los Vaqueros JPA Directors resignations.

I and other CCWD rate payers paid \$5M in 2017 for electricity to pump 40,000 acre-feet (AF) of Delta water up into Los Vaqueros 160,000 AF Reservoir for improved water quality and reliability. Now I have poor water quality and no different reliability than any other Californian.







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- The remaining \$0.9 million in outside services cost savings are from lower than budgeted Board election fees, other agency fees, equipment rental, maintenance expenses, and retiree medical plan expense reimbursements.
- Other Expenses: This expense category netted to \$0.2 million in cost savings.
 - Water purchases for normal operations were \$0.3 million lower than budget due to lower demands from untreated water customers and a 15% reduction in CVP water rates in 2017.
 - Energy expenses for normal operations exceeded budget by \$0.4 million. Untreated water energy expense was higher mainly due to increased use of the Mallard pump station. The higher energy cost is more than offset by lower water costs as the use of Mallard pump station is billed at lower, non-CVP water rates. Treated water energy expense was higher due to increased consumption in the summer. The budget was developed based on a 5% rebound. Actual treated water consumption was 12% higher than the prior year.
 - Other expenses that contributed to \$0.3 million in savings include lower fuel expenses, bad debt expense, and training expenses.
- LV Reservoir Filling: The District was able to add approximately 40,000 acre-feet of water into storage at the LV Reservoir in FY17. In addition, 3,837 acre-feet of water has been stored for WWD. Per agreement, WWD will reimburse the District for the actual cost of conveyance and storage. With the additional filling, LV Reservoir reached 96% capacity in FY17.

The total filling expense was \$5.0 million including water purchases and energy expenses, of which \$0.4 million is to be reimbursed by WWD. The District took the opportunity of favorable water quality conditions to use the lower cost LV water rights for a portion of the filling, which resulted in approximately \$0.5 million in cost savings as compared to the rate for CVP water.

2022 DROUGHT PROGRAM FOR SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMERS

California is in a serious drought. For residential customers served by Contra Costa Water District, 15% conservation is mandatory, and a new drought surcharge is effective July 1, 2022.

California is in the third year of drought and we must take steps to conserve more water now to protect our community should this drought continue into next year or longer. We recognize that many of you have taken steps to conserve and we thank you! Please take another look at where you use water most, especially outdoors, and find ways to save even more – even a little will add up to a lot when we all pitch in.

The temporary drought surcharge (\$0.79 added to each unit, or 748 gallons, of water used) will apply to water used after July 1 and will cover the impacts of the drought on our water system. Please note that if you achieve the 15% conservation goal, the total due on your water bill should remain about the same. The surcharge will only remain in place while we are in this drought emergency. There will be a non-rate funded credit of the surcharge automatically applied to households that use less than 200 gallons per day.

Action item 7 on the 6 July 2022 CCWD Board meeting agenda is to balloon to \$2,095,000 the 30 Jan 2017 \$80,000 Stantec sole source contract for Los Vaqueros Reservoir approved by then General Manager Jerry Brown. The public deserves competitively bid contracts and it is written into the Los Vaqueros Reservoir Early Funding Agreement CCWD signed with the CWC. I request CWC Staff mark "Non reimbursable" on Los Vaqueros Reservoir 275,000 AF invoices that contain Stantec fees and request a refund from the JPA.

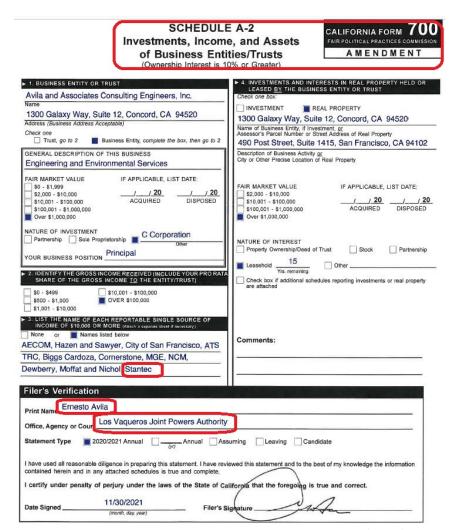
