Pathways: Level of Engagement

Inform: Learn about and raise awareness of existing efforts.

INFORM EXAMPLE: Educate about an agency drought outreach campaign.

Complement: Enhance coordination by contributing to ongoing efforts and addressing specific gaps where DRIP can add value.

COMPLEMENT EXAMPLE:

Review campaign and provide feedback to strengthen messaging and expand reach.

Lead: Take initiative (coordinate new efforts, drive solutions, etc.) on issues lacking adequate attention.

LEAD EXAMPLE: Develop a statewide drought outreach initiative tailored to underserved regions.

Consider:

How could the ideas change if DRIP were to Inform, Compliment, or Lead?

July 17th DRIP Collaborative Meeting – Status

Eco2. Streamline Grant & Contract Processes

(Redgie Collins and Samantha Arthur)

- Expand Cutting the Green Tape and other efficiency practices across agencies
- Members supportive, but want the value-add clarified

Eco3. O&M for Habitat Restoration Projects

- Expand long-term stewardship, legal frameworks, and sustainable funding
- Distinct from streamlining; O&M terms often set in grants

Proposed Pathways:

Inform or Complement:

SME presentation on *Cutting the Green Tape* + drought-specific case studies

Inform:

Revisit in future meeting, informed by California Water Commission drought white paper



Refresher & Pathways

July 17th DRIP Collaborative Meeting – Status

Eco1. Instream Flows (Redgie Collins)

- Originally framed as piloting landowner agreements in small coastal streams
- July SME presentations:
 - TNC: flow protections for drought resilience
 - SWB: Scott/Shasta curtailments & Local Cooperative Solutions
- Interest in adaptive water rights tools (forbearance agreements, instream leases, storage flexibility)
- Preference to document & promote best practices rather than launch new pilot

Proposed Pathways:

Lead:

- Explore idea of best practices document on cooperative approaches
- Outline sections and content
- Identify potential drafters and consider state review role
- Highlight key tools and case studies



Discussion Questions:

- What existing resources could this build off of?
- What could the document include?
- Who could lead drafting, and who could review?
- Which water rights tools and case studies could be highlighted?


