

RESOURCE GUIDE FOR CALIFORNIA AND DELTA INFORMATION

Water and other related resources in California, and specifically the Delta, are managed by several agencies. This resource guide is intended to help you find information to water-related and other associated questions either within the Department of Water Resources' (DWR) various divisions or outside of the department.

WATER QUALITY IN THE DELTA

The <u>State Water Resources Control Board</u> (State Water Board) is responsible for setting water quality standards throughout California, including salinity standards. This includes water distributed by the State Water Project (SWP), which must comply with the rules and regulations established under State Water Board processes. The State Water Board is currently contemplating changes under its ongoing Water Quality Control Plan Update, which would apply to the SWP. Additional State Water Board resources:

HARMFUL ALGAL BLOOMS AND DRINKING WATER

The State Water Board's <u>Division of Drinking Water</u> is responsible for ensuring all public water systems throughout California have access to clean, potable water at all times. This includes addressing concerns related to harmful algal blooms and potentially associated toxins. The State Water Board tracks Harmful Algae Bloom instances on a <u>publicly available map</u>. FISHERIES

California fisheries, including in the Delta, are managed by the <u>California Department of Fish and Wildlife</u> (CDFW) in coordination with two federal agencies–National Marine Fisheries Service/ National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and US Fish and Wildlife Service. Fisheries policy and management decisions are often set for CDFW by the <u>California Fish and Game</u> <u>Commission</u>. Contacts:

NUTRIA

Nutria are mammals the size of a beaver with a tail like a muskrat, and also an invasive species that threaten Delta habitats.

- Suspected observations or potential signs of nutria in California should be photographed and immediately reported to CDFW <u>online</u>, by email at <u>Invasives@wildlife.ca.gov</u> or by calling (866) 440-9530
- Observations on state or federal lands should be immediately reported to local agency staff
- If this species is captured, **do not release it,** immediately contact your local CDFW office or County Agricultural Commissioner

AIR QUALITY

California's local <u>Air Districts</u> are responsible for regional air quality planning, monitoring, and stationary source and facility permitting. The districts administer air quality improvement grant programs and are the <u>California Air Resources Board</u>'s primary partners in efforts to ensure that all Californians breathe clean air. CLIMATE CHANGE

The State of California has a goal of reducing its greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by 40% below 1990 levels by 2030 and 80% below 1990 levels by 2050. Additional information on various climate change programs:

- The <u>California Climate Action Registry</u> was created in 2001 to promote and protect businesses' early actions to manage and reduce their GHG emissions. The registry established protocols and an online tool to serve as a central database for emissions reports.

DELTA CONVEYANCE PROJECT

The proposed Delta Conveyance Project would modernize the water transport infrastructure in the Delta by adding new facilities in the north Delta to divert water and upgrading the current system to also include a tunnel for conveyance. If approved, these updates would ensure climate resiliency and the reliability of the state's largest source of safe, affordable and clean water for 27 million Californians, 750,000 acres of farmland and continued support for local water supply projects, such as local storage, recycling, groundwater recharge and water quality management. The Delta is the center of California's vital water distribution system and a critical link in how water is moved to all parts of the state, however, the infrastructure that moves this water through the Delta is outdated and at risk of failure due to sea level rise or seismic activity. 
